They further reveal how, with the maturation of state socialism, new class interests arose which were cultivated by, and in turn influenced, the Gorbachev leadership. The authors put forth the argument that these class interests are strongly represented in todayĐ²Đ,â,¢s political "settlement" in Russia. They consider various interpretations of what has led to RussiaĐ²Đ,â,¢s current condition, including the idea that "executive" capital is more important than political capital and has been reproduced in the transition from communism..
