Personal Service Companies The Chairman of Committees to move that a Select Committee be appointed to consider the consequences of the use of personal service companies for tax collection, and to make recommendations; and that, as proposed by the Committee of Selection, the following members be appointed to the Committee:

Lord Stevenson of Balmacara to move, as an amendment to the motion that the bill be now read a second time, at end to insert "but that this House regrets Her Majesty's Government's decision to introduce the Bill which authorises preparatory expenditure on a railway as the Bill is premature in the light of (1) the failure to settle upon a route which is consistent with the Government's statutory duty to have regard to the conservation and enhancement of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, and (2) the failure to specify further detail on the route and a limit on expenditure".

\*Lord Naseby to ask Her Majesty's Government what steps they will take in response to calls from the Confederation of British Industry, the British Chambers of Commerce and the British Retail Consortium for a reduction in and reform of Business Rates, particularly in relation to high street retailers.

Baroness Kinnock of Holyhead to ask Her Majesty's Government, further to the remarks by Lord Wallace of Saltaire on 7 November (HL Deb, GC 169), whether his comment that the United Kingdom did not channel aid through the government of Sudan took into account the funding of training for police and prison officers in that country. Â Â HL3332

Baroness Kinnock of Holyhead to ask Her Majesty's Government what are the "huge" development programmes in Sudan referred to by the United Kingdom ambassador to that country in his statement on 12 March following the visit of Lynne Featherstone, the Parliamentary Under-Secretary for International Development. Â Â HL3334

Lord Ahmed to ask Her Majesty's Government which organisations, media outlets, public relations or education specialists, other than the Mir Khalil ur Rahman Foundation, have been granted money from the media campaign grant of the Pakistan education awareness programme for advocacy and transforming education; and what were the total amounts in each case. Â Â HL3344

Lord Alton of Liverpool to ask Her Majesty's Government, further to the Written Answers by Earl Howe on 8 January (WA 22'4), to what extent the record of failed treatment cycles at a licensed centre may be affected by the requirement that a cycle should be reported to the Human Fertilisation and Embryology Authority (HFEA) wherever it was abandoned due to the risk of developing ovarian hyperstimulation syndrome; what, if any, assessment they have made of the impact of that requirement on the continuation of treatment with transfer of embryos to the patient's womb and on the freezing of embryos; and what, if any, steps the HFEA proposes to take in response to such an assessment.

Lord Alton of Liverpool to ask Her Majesty's Government, further to the Written Answers by Earl Howe on 22 January (WA 194'5) and 23 January (WA 215'6), what assessment the Human Fertilisation and Embryology Authority has made of the impact of the publication of data on headline success rates per cycle on competition on success rates between clinics. Â Â HL3347

Lord Alton of Liverpool to ask Her Majesty's Government what assessment they have made of the statements by the Chair of the Human Fertilisation and Embryology Authority on 25 October that

the "world of IVF is a market" and her expression of regret at not having "spoken more words of caution for those proposing to undertake IVF". Â Â HL3348

Lord Hunt of Kings Heath to ask Her Majestyâ€™s Government what assessment they have made of the impact of the European Union Procurement Directives, to be implemented in the United Kingdom during 2014; and what plans have been made for consultation on the permitted light touch regime which will apply to health, social care and education. Â Â [I]Category 2: Remunerated employment, office, profession etc.

Lord Laird to ask Her Majestyâ€™s Government, further to the Written Answer by Lord Wallace of Saltaire on 8 November (WA 27), why the forfeiture of an individual pension for a criminal conviction of a civil servant related to their employment or work is a confidential matter in cases where the details of the conviction have been publicised; what assessment they have made of the deterrent value of such a decision being made known; and whether all such convictions are being brought to the attention of the Cabinet Office under the advisory guidance to employing departments on consideration of forfeiture or other pension penalties. Â Â HL3357

Lord Laird to ask Her Majestyâ€™s Government what assessment they have made of the number of people currently in private sector defined benefit or final salary pension schemes and similar public sector schemes respectively; what has been the change in numbers of members in such schemes over the last five years; and how they are addressing any decline. Â Â HL3360

2 Barony of Henniker in the Peerage of Ireland (Barony of Hartismere in the Peerage of the United Kingdom) The Petition of Mark Ian Philip Chandos Henniker-Major claiming to have succeeded to the Barony of Henniker in the Peerage of Ireland (Barony of Hartismere in the Peerage of the United Kingdom) was presented and was referred to the Lord Chancellor for a report to the House pursuant to Standing Order 79.

13 Financial Services (Banking Reform) Bill Lord McFall of Alcluith moved that this House takes note of the number and complexity of amendments tabled by Her Majestyâ€™s Government at Committee Stage of the Financial Services (Banking Reform) Bill, and of the case for measured consideration of the Bill. After debate, the motion was withdrawn.
