But the pictures were really well done and the arrow made it very clear HOW the techniques were done. I also really liked that it gave variations on each technique, so that you could find the one that worked best for you or in a specific situation.

If you're going into osteopathic medicine, you'll probably need this book. This is a second edition; it has significant additions and alterations from the first edition, so if you're trying to decide whether you can get away with using the first edition, know that you would be missing a significant amount of information (I haven't gotten there yet, but I've been told it's most noticeable in the counterstrain techniques section).
