My kids adore this book. It's a very quick read--you can zip right through the short, meaty text. Yet the message is profound. Nino the pizza-maker closes down his cheerful little pizzeria and builds a big, fancy restaurant. He makes lots of money, but sacrifices precious time with his family, comes home exhausted and no longer enjoys his work. Saddest of all, he neglects his little son Tony, formerly known as his "best helper." Fortunately, Nino quickly realizes his mistake. He leaves the big restaurant behind and reopens his beloved pizzeria...renaming it after his son. It's amazing how the author manages to tell this whole story in so few words, and the vibrant, colorful artwork perfectly captures the characters' emotions. This book is a winner!

Tony's dad has a very popular little pizzeria. Tony loves helping out around the place. But one day an important man comes and soon Tony's dad has a much bigger pizza place. But there doesn't seem to be any place for Tony there, or any time for Tony to spend with his dad any more. Soon Tony's dad quits the big restaurant and re-opens his little pizzeria.

I like the story and funny illustrations. It is about the boy who likes to help his father in the pizzeria. He feels good to be important there, he has responsibilities there. But his father accepts the "big offer" and opens franchise restaurant. Things started to change for him and his family, a little Tony doesn't feel important anymore, he is on everybody's way. The story has a good ending and good to read when students have a "family" lesson.

Tony and his father own a pizza parlor, and has the most delicious pizza! As their restaurant gets more and more famous, their family unfortunately is unable to do what they love to do best: make

pizza! This book has great vocabulary for sight words, and is good for a comprehension lesson; predicting what will happen next, and why they think Tony and his dad were no longer able to make as many pizzas as they used to.

This was a favorite for our family. The story is cute & funny and the illustrations are so vibrant and colorful. My 4yr old and 2yr old never tired of this story. There were always new and wonderful details to be found in the pictures. We borrowed it from the library but look forward to purchasing our own for our book collection.

This book teaches children about the importance of family. It could also be used to teach the lesson that "bigger is not always better." When Nino leaves behind his small pizzeria for a large restaurant, he realizes that he is sacrificing time with his family and no longer enjoys what he does so he soon decides to reopen his old, small, cheerful pizzeria.

Barbour gives us an old-fashioned morality tale for children, rendered in 1980s style. Nino runs a crowded but cheerful pizzeria, "Little Nino's." Tony, his son, gets to help serve the friendly patrons. One day, a portly man in a green suit patterned with dollar signs appears. He and Nino open a chic, expensive "Big Ninostet," and Tony is miserable; when he tries to help, he gets underfoot. Worse, there's a new chef, named Francois, and only snooty couples eat there. Disillusioned, Nino decides to return to his humble but satisfying origins and reopens his old joint, now named "Little Tony's." Tony gets a lesson in the corrupting power of money but narrowly escapes its real world repercussions. Barbour's illustrations are as handsome as the clientele at the upscale restaurant: using a bordered rectangular format, her figures are flattened like Matisse's; crowded together, they make a collage-like field of bright color and lively pattern. But their level of appeal is perhaps more suited to adult book buyers than young readers. And, unfortunately, in Barbour's telling, the characters remain as flat as the stylized pictures. Ages 4-8. K-Gr 2 Although Barbour's pleasant story is only meager fare, her paintings are a visual feast. Young Tony proudly tells of how he helps his father, Nino, in his pizzeria until success causes Nino to open a large, fancy restaurant, where Tony is in the way and Nino is too busy for him. All ends well when Nino misses the smaller operation and reopens his pizzeria. The gouache and watercolor illustrations in wild tropical colors have a kitschy, 1930s look to them and show homage to many artists of that period. Faces bring Leger to mind; swirling lines and rounded shapes are reminiscent of Matisse; glowing stars and moon recall Chagall. There are also fauvist and cubist influences throughout. Lettering and bold patterns mix with flat blocks of intense color in crowded scenes that express the big city atmosphere through their vitality.
