Through Jade's experiences the author explores many of the issues being faced by our nation's schools. What I enjoyed most about the book was Murray's ability to use humor to address very serious matters that plague our educational system. I found myself wondering whether I was laughing at the humor, or laughing to keep from crying about the sad realities that many students face. As a person who has worked in the

school system, I could relate to many of the topics he addressed, such as out of touch

administrators, teen suicide, school violence, teen pregnancy, and the lack of parental involvement. While the novel touches on a lot of serious concerns, the plot is witty and engaging. As Jade learns how the system works and then learns to work the system, I found myself anxiously flipping pages to see how her next drama would unfold. Despite the fact the book's primary focus is on Jade's professional development, the story also highlights her personal growth.

This book started a little slowly for me, but it wasn't long before I found myself caught up in Jade's antics and the ever unfolding drama she encountered. This book will have wide reaching appeal because the characters in the book are diverse and the issues addressed are universal. With laugh out loud humor and a strong, socially conscious plot, JADE ED offers a one-two punch.
