With this massive guide, there's no such thing as unfamiliar territory.

We are fulltime RVer's-which means we live in the RV year round. I was using an old Next Exit and had this book recommended by another fulltime rv couple. The 2 major assets of this particular Interstate book are each interstate follows through the states and are in numerical order starting with I-4 ending with the city loop road I-710 and number 2-every few pages there is a spot inserted with enough room to write your own notes. No other books that I've used have that feature. OH and I forgot it's also spiral bound, makes page flipping a breeze.

We have been RV'ing for about 6 years, the last 3 in a 40 foot motorhome. Until we purchased the 2010 "Exit Now: Interstate Exit Directory" we relied upon a similar publication called "The Next Exit", which we considered an essential part of our travels. However, since purchasing the 2010 "Exit Now: Interstate Exit Directory" and relying upon it on our last trip (2300 miles), the paper-back "Next Exit" has become history. The 2010 "Exit Now: Interstate Exit Directory" is much easier and faster to use. The large spiral-binding allows the pages to be easily turned and the book lays flat while open.

To illustrate the directory's ease of use I will use an example. In the "Next Exit" one would first look up Georgia, find I-20 and follow it to the Alabama line where one would then be required to look up Alabama, find I-20, follow it to the Mississippi line, then look up Louisiana, find I-20, follow it to the Texas line, and then look up Texas, find I-20 and follow it to your destination. Each state traveled

through required a new "lookup" as opposed to the new 2010 "Exit Now: Interstate Exit Directory" in which one simply looks up I-20 and follows it all the way from Georgia to Texas simply by turning the pages and following one continuous "thread" through Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, and into Texas and your destination.

We bought Next Exit in 2004 and have used it a lot while driving the Interstate highway system. In general, it has proven to be accurate and useful, but has become very dogeared, torn, and worn due to the "newsprint" grade of the paper and conventional binding. Also, Next Exit takes you from one side of a state to the other on a given highway. When you reach the border of a state, you have to search out the next state to continue your journey.

Ever been way out in the middle of nowhere, road weary, hungry, and longing for a *good* cup of coffee? Just flip open the book and check what's down at the next exit: nothing. The exit after that? Gotcha! A Starbucks and a decent restaurant on the north side of the highway. That's how this book works. We borrowed one from friends for a recent long road trip, and bought our own on the way home. Tells you about what food and lodging is available within a few miles of the exit - for EVERY exit on the Interstates. Awesome find.

This book is the best. We have an RV and the ability to know ahead of time where you plan to get gas or take a rest break has been marvelous. Often times it is difficult to find a gas station that is laid out well enough to maneuver a large rig in. This solves that problem most of the time. I really like that the interstates are listed from start to finish across all states rather than state by state, interstate by interstate. No flipping pages whenever you cross a state line. In summary, terrific book!!!

Got my copy yesterday and was really disappointed with the inaccuracy I found in the listings for exits on I-70 near Wentzville, Mo. The errors I noted were all with facilities that have not existed for more than three years. Based on these findings I wonder how accurate all the other listings are in the book. I also purchased The Next Exit at the same time and it had none of the erroneous listings. This was the first time I have bought Exit Now and it will be the last.

Just received the 2011 Exit Now and am thrilled with this directory. No more flipping to a new page when you enter a different state, no more trying to keep two separate pages open when nearing a state border, spiral binding makes it easy to keep pages open when changing interstate, exit facilities are line by line instead of being lumped together in one paragraph. Had Next Exit for the past couple of years and hated it. Ready to hit the road and use this book!!!!

As a trucker, this is a great book. I also travel in my car and never leave without having it along. You used to be able to find this book at truck stops everywhere, now it is hard to find any exit guide, and if you do, it won't be this one. I think the reason may be is because this book is not compact enough anymore, because it lists so many things that traveling folks need! It is now spiral bound too, instead of just glue bound, so that increases the size too, but if you want the bestbook that is the easiest to use and read...this is it!! The other book, "The Next Exit", in my opinion, comes in fourth place in a field of two!! Like I mentioned earlier, this book is very large though, but with the spiral binding you can fold it in half and keep only your page visible and then turn the page as needed. I might have given this only 4 stars, because of the size, but then, how can you make it any smaller without taking so much away from it? It is much better than "The Next Exit" which is smaller, have smaller "newsprint" pages that lump everything together so it is hard to read what is at which exit and on which side...and forget about accidently spilling something on the pages! Urghh!! Over a short amount of time, "The Exit Guide" binder will also fall apart, leaving pages all ove that you have to now keep together until you can find and buy a replacement book. NOT GOOD if you are also one that likes to make notes in the book as to favorite place, etc. This guide is larger print and tells you at a glance which way to turn off the exit ramp to get where you need to go far in advance of the exit!! It reads left to right just like any English language book does, unlike "The Next Exit". Read more ›

The descriptions are, well, there are none! It is just a list of exits and the names of the food, hotel, etc. establishments on them. (I am not sure what criteria they used for inclusion. Was it everything

within half a mile of the exit center? I know some exits that have nothing on them, but drive a mile up the road and you can find incredible food, a nicer place to stay, etc. The impression is that, quality is not part of the inclusion process.)

This product is BEGGING to be an APP on an iPad where it could be truly useful, updated easily when changes happen, and more content and detail can be included not only by the publisher but also by travelers. A small version for the iPhone would be incredible too. It could be used in the car either way but the iPhone could be used by the driver more easily. Yes, Kindle and other pad app version too. Saying Apple devices here because they are the big player with best interface and OS for this kind of product.

You need an EXIT GUIDE of some sort. This one falls short of 5-stars because of some problems, but there are positive features that help keep it at 4-stars. This is our first such guide and we took it on a 9000 mile vacation this summer. We used it to quickly find the nearest fuel, dump station, RV store and specifically walmarts and cracker-barrel restaurants (they usually have RV parking).

CONS: Flimsy paper. If you or your navigator are using it on the fly, you are going to mess up the pages. They tear easy and easily deform when wet from even hand-sweat. We didn't use the "tabs" (stickers) because I feared that would make it worse. Instead, we used a bookmark. If we had changed highways since last use, it was still easy to find the next highway with the ascending numeration. Hardly worth deducting a star, since it's features still seem easier to use than the other guides I considered. The BIG deduction is for accuracy. While I would say it was 90% accurate the times we used it for our trip, that 10% really gets to you when the needle is dipping toward "E". I was surprised how many truck-stops and travel-centers in the guide were closed. More than one of them had enough grafitti and weeds to have been closed since before the previous edition of the guide. The most frustrating was that TWICE we went looking for "Camping World" stores that were no longer there (after a lot of driving around and asking directions. (So much for the "Good Sam" partership.Read more ›
